GOD'S HOUSE

The Church is God's special dwelling place and some people come to pray, so please be aware of this and please refrain from idle chatter before and after Mass. We should behave differently in God's House as opposed to being at home, at the mall, a grocery store or a civic center.

CRECHE

Francis called it a "crèche", the French word for cradle. Francis created the first crèche using real people, a real manger, a real ox and ass, and real shepherds. The Incarnation – Christmas – was a key component in the spirituality of Francis. He wanted to celebrate the Incarnation in a special way. He wanted to do something that would help people remember the Christ Child and how He was born in Bethlehem. Francis wanted people to see and experience how the Christ Child lay on the hay in a manger with an ox and an ass standing by.

It was Christmas Eve in the year 1223. At the appointed time, Franciscan Brothers came to the new Bethlehem. Men, women, and children from the area also came to celebrate. The torches they carried lit up the night as they approached the crèche. Once again shepherds were walking in the night to come and adore Him. All were filled with joy over the mystery of the Incarnation. And a great tradition began.

As you look upon your Nativity set, may you remember and celebrate again God's love for His creation. To show His abundant love, mercy and forgiveness, He became a person like us. This is what the crèche symbolizes. From The Life of St. Francis by Thomas of Celano.

ADVENT WREATH

The origins of the Advent wreath are found in the folk practices of the pre-Christian Germanic peoples, who, during the cold December darkness of Eastern Europe, gathered wreaths of evergreen and lighted fires as signs of hope in a coming spring and renewed light. Christians kept those popular traditions alive, and by the 16th century Catholics and Protestants throughout Germany used these symbols to celebrate their Advent hope in Christ, the everlasting Light. From Germany, the use of the Advent wreath spread to other parts of the Christian world. Traditionally, the wreath is made of four candles in a circle of evergreens. Three candles are violet, and the fourth is rose for the third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday, from the Latin word "Rejoice"). The rejoicing comes from the fact that Advent is half over, and Christmas is soon to follow. If we listen to Isaiah, we may understand the symbolism of the wreath more clearly: The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light; on those who lived in a land as dark as death, a light has dawned. You have increased their joy and given them great gladness; they rejoice in your presence as those who rejoice at harvest, as warriors exult when dividing spoil. Is:9.1-2

The popular Christmas carol *Stille Nacht* (Silent Night) was first sung on December 24, 1818, in the Church of St. Nicholas in Oberndorf, Austria. The lyrics were written by the curate, Fr. Josef Mohr, who was inspired by a baby seen on a sick call earlier in the day. The organ in the church was broken, therefore the music for his carol was initially written for guitar and consisted of six stanzas, three more than we are used to hearing.

Christmas Greens

Holly and Mistletoe or other Evergreens have been used to decorate for thousands of years in many cultures. Evergreens are symbols of enduring life since they stay "alive" all winter when most plants wither and die. Some believed evergreens had magical power due to their constant greenness. Homes were decorated with evergreens in the hope of enticing the spirits of the woods inside to bring good luck in the coming year. They were twisted into a circle, symbol of eternity, and suspended from ceilings after being attached to wagon wheels, brought inside to protect them from the winter elements. Candles were often added to give light to the room – and presto: Advent wreaths were born! Some consider holly "masculine" since it uses its thorns to protect itself, as men use weapons to protect themselves; ivy is "feminine" since it entwines or embraces whatever it is near. Since mistletoe was thought to bring good luck and fertility, the Scandinavians began the custom of "kissing under the mistletoe." In Norse mythology, an evil spirit formed an arrow from mistletoe and killed Baldur, the god of innocence, beauty, joy, purity, and peace. As his mother wept, her tears became the white berries of the mistletoe – and his life was restored! In thanks, his mother, Frigga, the goddess of love and beauty, is said to kiss anyone who passes under mistletoe. Even enemies would call a truce when they met underneath it.

CCD CORNER

As we move closer to the celebration of our Lord's birth, our CCD children are busy using this season of Advent to prepare their hearts and souls for this great feast day. **Mrs. Koch's 4th Grade Class** constructed an Advent chain where each link of the chain was made of construction paper and symbolizes the days of Advent leading up to the birth of our Lord Jesus. Each day, the student will remove one link and say a prayer or do a kind act, etc. What a great way for a family to come together in faith. **Mr. Perricelli's 7th Grade Class** took a tag off the *Giving Tree* (in church) and as a class contributed enough money to purchase the gift that was being requested. Sharing our gifts with the poor and needy is living proof that the Gospel is alive and well in the hearts of our young people! This Advent, may we suggest that you as a family follow the lead of our children and perform a spiritual and corporal work of kindness as you prepare for the holiday and holiday we call Christmas!

THE UNBELIEVER

Once upon a time, there was a man who looked upon Christmas as a lot of humbug. He wasn't a Scrooge. He was a very kind and decent person, generous to his family, upright in all his dealing with other men. But he didn't believe all that stuff about an incarnation which churches proclaim at Christmas. And he was too honest to pretend that he did. "I am truly sorry to distress you," he told his wife, who was a faithful churchgoer, "but I simply cannot understand this claim that God became man. It doesn't make any sense to me." On Christmas Eve, his wife and children went to church for the midnight service. He declined to accompany them. "I'd feel like a hypocrite," he explained. "I'd much rather stay at home, but I'll wait up for you." Shortly after his family drove away in the car, snow began to fall. He went to the window and watched the flurries getting heavier and heavier. "If we must have Christmas," he reflected "it's nice to have a white one." He went back to his chair by the fireside and began to read his newspaper. A few minutes later, he was startled by a thudding sound. It was quickly followed by another, then another. He thought that someone must be throwing snowballs at his living-room window. When he went to the front door to investigate, he found a flock of birds huddled miserably in the snow. They had been caught in the storm, and in a desperate search for shelter had tried to fly through his window.

"I can't let these poor creatures lie there and freeze," he thought. "but how can I help them?" Then he remembered the barn where the children's pony was stabled. It would provide a warm shelter. He quickly put on his coat and galoshes and tramped through the deepening snow to the barn. He opened the doors wide and turned on the light. But the birds didn't come in. "Food will bring them in," he thought. So, he hurried back to the house for bread crumbs, which he sprinkled on the snow to make a trail into the barn. To his dismay, the birds ignored the bread crumbs and continued to flop around helplessly in the snow. He tried shooing them into the barn by walking around and waving his arms. They scattered in every direction except into the warm, lighted barn. "They find me a strange and terrifying creature," he said to himself, "and I can't seem to think of any way to let them know they can trust me. If only I could be a bird myself and for a few minutes, perhaps I could lead them to safety."

Just at that moment, the church bells began to ring. He stood silently for a while, listening to the bells pealing the glad tidings of Christmas. Then he sank to his knees in the snow. "Now I understand," he whispered. "Now I see why You had to do it."

CHRISTMAS CARDS

Christmas Cards began in 1843 when a young British civil servant, who had no time to write Christmas letters to all his friends and relatives, asked an artist to design a card for him with the words: "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you." The card showed a family raising their glasses in a toast, which angered English Puritans who declared it promoted drunkenness! But 1,000 cards were sold at a penny a piece, and since the first 'cheap' stamp had been introduced in Britain in 1840, a new tradition began! A few years later, an American of German descent, Louis Prang, the "father of American Christmas Cards," designed and printed beautiful, but rather expensive, cards. Eventually, mass produced, less expensive cards flooded the market; US companies began to make them when German products were 'taboo' during WWI and WWII, and a 165 year-old tradition began!

Confession Definition

For a sin to be mortal, three conditions must together be met: "Mortal sin is sin whose object is grave matter and which is also committed with full knowledge and deliberate consent." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, No. 1857).

Grave Matter

What constitutes "grave matter"? Some common sins, according to the bishops: missing Sunday Mass, sex outside marriage (including pornography and masturbation), serious theft, abortion, defamation of character and purposely getting drunk.

Concerns & Answers

Can't I talk to God directly, not a priest to get forgiveness? Not according to the Bible. Read John 20:21-23; 2 Corinthians 2:10; and 2 Corinthians 5:18

If God knows everything we do, then how come we have to go to confession? You may know your friend broke your iPod, but wouldn't it be aggravating if he knew you knew, but still didn't say "I'm sorry"?

Doesn't God forgive no matter what? If we think of sin as merely breaking rules, it is hard to understand why God can't just "look the other way." But sin is real; it hurts us and makes us distant from Him – and unable to enter heaven. We can only be restored if we confess.

Confession just gives people the idea that it's all right to sin as long as you're sorry later. If a man is confessing drunkenness while he has plans with his buddies to go barhopping and get drunk again the coming weekend, he can't be forgiven. He has to have decided to stop. Confession stops sins; it doesn't start them.

CONFESSION/RECONCILIATION

Our Lord told St. Margaret Mary Alacoque that individuals should go to confession **at a minimum once a month**. This sacrament is offered EVERY Saturday from 11:00AM to Noon and 3:00-3:30PM, every morning at 7:30AM, as well as every First Friday at 6:30PM. A Priest is also available to hear Confessions daily by appointment.
