

EASTER DUTY

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty), that is the **obligation of receiving the Eucharist for Easter extends to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, May 22**. No one conscious of committing a serious or mortal sin should receive Holy Communion until they have first gone to the Sacrament of Reconciliation a.k.a. Confession. Confessions are heard EVERY Saturday from 11:00AM to Noon and 3:00-3:25PM, every weekday morning at 7:30AM, and Fridays from 6:30-6:50PM. A Priest is also available to hear Confessions daily by appointment.

THE EASTER TRIDUUM - THE EASTER VIGIL

The Easter Vigil is the most important Mass of the year. In the complete ranking of all Catholic Church celebrations, the Triduum occupies the **top spot**. The Triduum, which begins with Holy Thursday's Mass of the Lord's Supper, concludes on Easter, reaching its climax with the Easter Vigil. If there is one Mass in which Catholics would make an effort to participate every year, it is the Easter Vigil. If you attend Mass on Easter Sunday morning, but miss the Easter Vigil, you have missed the most important celebration of the year. The Easter Vigil celebrates the Resurrection of Christ and the commitment of believers. It has **FOUR PARTS**. It **FIRST** begins with a **Service of Light**. The community of believers gathers in darkness to hear that Christ is our light, shattering the darkness of sin. The **SECOND** part of the Vigil is the **Liturgy of the Word**. We hear up to nine Scriptural passages that retell the story of salvation, ending with the Gospel of the Resurrection. The **THIRD** part is the **Liturgy of Baptism**. Some catechumens have already been listed among the elect, those chosen for baptism this year. They now come forward to be plunged into the waters of new birth. Anointed with Sacred Chrism, they celebrate Confirmation, receiving the strength of God's Spirit for the Christian life. Then all those present in the Church renew their Baptismal promises. Together we pledge our faith in the Resurrection and promise to follow Christ more closely. The Vigil culminates in the **FOURTH** part, the **Liturgy of the Eucharist**. Together with the newly Baptized, we will join in the Holy Eucharist. At the Easter Vigil we recommit ourselves to our faith and rejoice with the newly Baptized.

EASTER EGG HUNT

On Easter Sunday morning the OLV Youth Group will host an Easter Egg hunt for little Children. The hunt will take place after the 9:30 Masses in the outside area (weather permitting) by the back parking lot entrance of the OLV school building.

GOOD FRIDAY REGULATIONS

Good Friday is a day of both **Fast and Abstinence** which means only one **(1) full meal is permitted**. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast. On Good Friday **no meat** may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

In REPARATION for ABORTION

A peaceful and prayerful march in reparation for abortion will be held on Good Friday in Englewood. You're invited to join the Legion of Mary and the Franciscan Friars of the Renewal to pray the Stations of the Cross, the Rosary, and the Chaplet of Divine Mercy. They will assemble at 9:30 a.m. in the parking lot at the corner of Demarest Street and Dean Street and march to the abortion clinic at 40 Engle Street. As this is a peaceful event, please do not bring signs or posters.

The Good Friday Collection Explained

The Jerusalem Cross. If you have the opportunity to visit the Holy Land you will see this cross displayed everywhere. The meaning behind the Jerusalem Cross can be explained in many ways. The most famous are its representation of the Five Wounds of Jesus Christ. Another is the large cross representing the Person of Jesus, with the smaller four crosses representing the Four Gospels spread to the Four Corners of the Earth started in the Upper Room, in Jerusalem, more than 2000 years ago on Pentecost. We are blessed with rich and marvelous tradition! The Good Friday collection is taken up once a year and provides the necessary basic cash flow, operating income if you will, to sustain the Catholic institutions in the Holy Land. It is our collective privilege and duty to preserve our tangible heritage in our Christian Holy Land. Please give generously!

QUESTION?

Where do we get the name Roman Catholic? The word Roman is derived from the fact that St. Peter, the first leader of the Church, established the headquarters of the Church in Rome. Being a Roman Catholic does not in any sense infer Roman citizenship. We are American Catholics in communion with The Church which has its center in Rome.

HELP EVANGELIZE

Why not face it? Most Catholics shy away from publicly engaging in evangelization. Those who know their faith will hesitate to discuss it with strangers, and those who don't know their faith as well as they should, usually find themselves running for cover when they think they may be asked to engage in evangelization. “PENANCE”

Penance is supposed to be tough. As the three sacred days of Holy Week approach, those of us in the hospital have little opportunity to do traditional penances. Because of illness, we also feel that we are doing enough. Perhaps a lot of other people who are not in the hospital but who have severe problems, heavy crosses, or chronic difficulties with family all feel that they too are doing enough. But this is a time to do more, or to do better what we always do, and to do it with much love for Christ. Because of the film *The Passion of the Christ*, millions of people have a better awareness of what Christ suffered for us. Penance is the scriptural way of showing one's gratitude. **Fr. TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Most Christians today receive a bunch of palm fronds, olive branches, pussy willow, or forsythia (a relative of the olive) to carry in procession and to bear home in blessing. Some even offer sprigs of palm or other branches as a gesture of peace to those they have offended. The desire is to make a clean sweep of your spiritual house before the Easter feast. Accepting the branch is a token of the bearer's willingness to journey with the Church through a grateful remembrance of Jesus Christ's passion, death, and life-giving resurrection. Traditionally, the plants associated with today's feast are planted in cemeteries as a sign of Christ's victory over death and the promise of new life. The joy of this day's opening procession soon gives way to a solemn reading of the Passion, this year according to Matthew. The ritual is meant not only to strengthen us to hear this account, but to stir us up to accompany the Church on this journey through Holy Week. It also prepares us for next Sunday's joyful renewal of our baptismal vows.

TEN COMMANDMENTS

The Ten Commandments have occupied a predominant place in the catechesis of baptismal candidates and the faithful. This Lent we will present an examination of conscience based on the Ten Commandments so you can prayerfully probe your mind and heart to prepare yourself for the Easter Sacraments and/or Confession/Reconciliation. Today we will consider the 8th, 9th and 10th Commandments. **VIII. "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor." [Exodus 20:16]** God, the source of all truth, calls us to live in truth and to follow the example of Jesus Christ, who is the fullness of God's Truth. Do I speak and act with truthfulness, sincerity and candor, guarding against duplicity, dishonesty and hypocrisy? Do I live as a true disciple of Christ, in simplicity of life in accord with the Lord Jesus' example? Do I speak and act truthfully, regardless of the consequences, as Jesus did before Pilate? Am I ashamed of my faith or reluctant to proudly profess it? Do I have a clean, clear conscience before God and all? Do I fulfill all the obligations of the Catholic Faith? Am I another Christ: have I put away falsehood, malice, guile, insincerity, envy and slander? Have I given false witness by spreading contrary to the truth, or committed perjury by lying under oath? Do I condemn the innocent; exonerate the guilty, increase the punishment of the accused? Am I guilty of rash judgment? Do I assume things about others without sufficient information? Do I disclose others' faults without a valid reason? Do I make untrue remarks as to harm another's reputation? Do I assess others positively, and give the benefit of the doubt? Do I correct others with love? Am I guilty of flattery, adulation, or false gratification which encourages others to sin? Do I boast, brag or exaggerate the truth? Do I lie or undermine the truth? Do I keep secrets and confidences, respecting privileged information? Do I avoid gossip and the violation of another's right to privacy? Have I defamed anyone, or joined in the destruction of another's reputation? Have I publicly made restitution (or secretly, if that is not possible) whenever I have spoken or acted falsely?

IX. "You shall not covet your neighbor's wife."

X. "You shall not covet your neighbor's house, or his manservant, or his maidservant, or his ox, or his ass, or anything that is your neighbor's." (See Exodus 20: 17) These two commandments are very similar: they warn us against three kinds of covetousness or concupiscence: *lust* of the flesh, *lust* of the eyes, and pride of life. Do I have an intense form of desire for anything sinful, in particular, the spouse or possessions of others? Do I keep the desires of my heart and mind pure, so that I am not overly tempted into sinful actions? Am I discreet and modest in my dress, language and actions? And am I patiently moderate in my loving relationships? Do I avoid unhealthy curiosity, voyeuristic exploration, and the permissiveness which can lead to sin? Do I try to see all things as God sees them? Do I practice the prayer, chastity, and purity of intention and vision necessary to keep these two commandments? Am I guilty of '*lust* of the eyes' which can lead to violence and injustice? Do I seek to control my urges and desires, even the normal, healthy ones like hunger, thirst, comfort and the like, so they do not get out of control and begin to control me? In my just desires to improve my *lot* in life, do I avoid all avarice, envy, greed, and unjust methods of acquisition? Am I consumed by the desire for more of the things of This world? Do I make God and the NEXT world a priority in my life? Am I properly detached from transitory, earthly goods?
