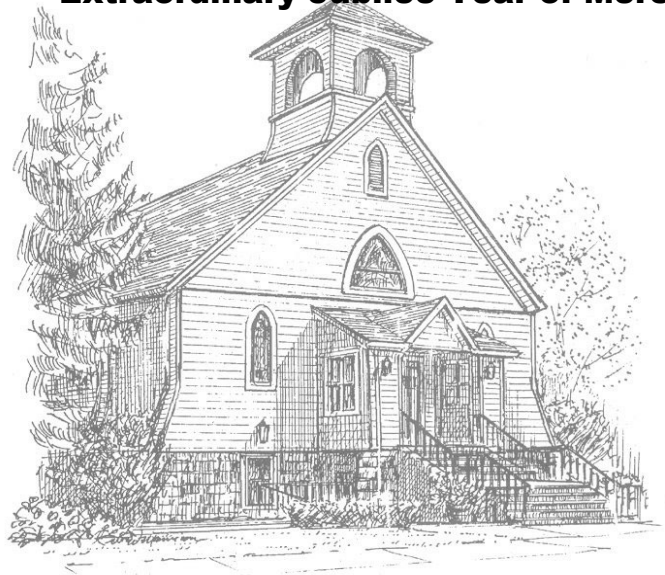

## **THE SABBATH**

In past times, Sabbath rest meant that overworked folks could simply have a day off. The idea extends beyond us human beings, to the work animals and the earth itself. Today, the needs of the average family may be different. But we must take time to just be still, or we can drive ourselves to illness.

Never has family time been more important. It is scandalous how little time many parents actually spend with their children in conversation. Many experts believe that the best thing we can do for our families is simply to eat together. Thus, bringing back the Sunday family dinner is both a great way to honor the Sabbath and to improve our family life. Many modern Catholic families seem comfortable with missing Mass once in a while. It is challenging when soccer matches, hockey practice or school fund-raising activities are scheduled on Sundays.

Parents need to do what they tell their children to do - stand up to peer pressure and just say no. They need to explain the value of gathering with the faith community to their children. Assembling as the Body of Christ transforms each of us individuals into something bigger, something more. It takes our focus from the daily activities to the higher gifts of faith, hope and love.

In praying with one another we give ourselves over to the Holy Spirit. And, of course, it is where we are nourished for our spiritual health. No one can tell a family when or how this Sabbath rest will happen for them. Each family needs to look at their own schedule and then evaluate what changes can be made. Everything goes back to the family, the domestic church. It is where we are schooled in all things of value.

A Priest is also available to hear Confessions daily by appointment.

## **Spiritual Priorities**

Don't we all know how confused everyday matters endlessly distract us and fill our thoughts and emotions. It seems like a waste of our precious time that we allow these same matters and activities, silly trifles that we will not even remember the day after tomorrow, to fill the time of our short lives, which, you would think that we would treasure above all else. All this cuts us off from Our Lord, shutting us off from Heaven and choking off prayer like smoke from a funnel rising and obscuring the light from the sun. And what is smoke? It is made up of tiny black particles. In just the same way, our sins and restlessness rise and obscure everything like smoke - so that our life ceases to be Christian, and becomes vain and pointless. Only a search for the Lord, a longing to touch Christ the healer, can give us victory. Now is the time to pray and make sacrifices. A small abstinence from food is a tiny, microscopic offering to God, and yet it is of great value. But greater still is to offer the Lord a prayer for each other not for ourselves, not for our own health, salvation, or well-being, but for our sisters and brothers, for those who are dear to our hearts; offer the Lord a prayer for them today, as the Gospel teaches us. Pray for them, that their way may be blessed, that the Lord may keep them and come to meet them - then all of us will ascend toward the Lord, as if holding on to that prayer. This is the main thing; the rest will follow - but this is essential to our lives. Then Jesus, seeing our faith, will say to all those for whom we have been praying, and to us, for whom they have been praying: "My child, awake from your sleep and your sickness, from your palsy, your spiritual paralysis; arise, your sins are forgiven you."

## **ROOTED**

As Catholics, we are to be rooted within a parish community, where we are obligated to come to be fed on God's Word in Scripture and on Christ's Body and Blood in the Eucharist at least once a week. To join our Parish, stop by the Rectory any weekday and meet Maria, the parish secretary, and register as a member of Our Lady of Victories Family.

## **Mary and the Church**

The parallel between Mary and the Church overcomes the two primary difficulties converts are likely to have with the doctrine of Mary as Mediatrix of all graces; it explains how all grace can come through Mary and how her position as Mediatrix strengthens rather than weakens our relationship with Christ. The Church Fathers have repeatedly affirmed that there is no salvation outside the Church, that "all salvation comes from Christ the Head through the Church which is His body".

## SUMMER ENVELOPES

We sincerely thank our parishioners who mail or deliver their weekly envelopes to the parish office while you are out of town on vacation this summer. As many of you understand, our parish expenses and obligations do not take a vacation when you do, so it is very helpful to be able to rely on your continued support even when you cannot personally attend Mass here at OLV.

### EUCCHARISTIC QUESTIONS

**May I receive more than once a day?** Yes; the Catechism #1388 says we should receive Communion at every Mass we participate in; the question is: why are you at more than one Mass a day? If there's a valid reason for attending Mass again: a funeral, wedding, ordination, vigil Mass, or other special event, you should receive again on the same day.

**May I receive 'communion' in non-Catholic Churches? May non-Catholics receive our Eucharist?** No; receiving Communion says we are one body – and that is, sadly, not yet true.

**Is there still an 'Easter Duty'?** Yes. Catechism #1389 says we must receive at least once a year, during the Easter Season, after celebrating Reconciliation, if need be!

**Must I receive the Precious Blood?** No. Catechism #1390 says receiving both forms of bread and wine is a more complete sign of the Eucharistic Banquet; however, we receive the entire Christ under either form. It is the sign-value of the Sacred Meal that is greater under both forms.

**May divorced Catholics receive Communion?** Yes, IF they are not invalidly remarried or guilty of serious sin. In fact, the divorced need Eucharist grace to meet the challenges of their situation.

**What is a 'valid' marriage?** One freely, honestly entered into by those who know themselves well. If both parties are Catholic, a Catholic priest or deacon must officiate; if only one is Catholic, it may take place before a Catholic priest or deacon – or with EXPLICIT permission, after all the requirements of the Catholic Church are met, by a minister, rabbi or justice of the peace. The marriage of two non-Catholics is always considered valid. Every valid marriage must be formally annulled by a Catholic Marriage Tribunal; we cannot simply disregard valid marriages. A marriage entered into without these requirements is invalid, and needs a simple declaration of nullity. A subsequent marriage that takes place without the necessary annulment or declaration of nullity is a serious offense; any Catholic involved in these marriages is banned from Holy Communion.

**Why is Church policy on divorced, invalidly remarried Catholics so harsh?** 1] God's gift of marriage is a major part of life, not of human origin, and must be respected as such. 2] Those who publicly violate Church law yet receive Communion give a false sign of unity. 3] Many people are no longer surprised when invalidly married Catholics receive Communion, so the Church must lovingly reaffirm this ban – so as to protect the sanctity of Marriage, Family and Christian Morality, which are all negatively affected by an 'anything goes' mentality. However, we may NEVER judge anyone's culpability or worthiness; when the Church denies Communion to those who blatantly disregard this ban, it does this ONLY for the gravest reasons—after attempts are made to explain/correct the situation. The intent is not to be harsh or cruel, but to show this is a very serious matter! In pastoral love and concern, the Church exhorts anyone in a questionably marital situation to take action to clarify and/or rectify their marriage!

**QUESTION**

What are the seven deadly sins? They are:

- Pride** - is the excessive conceit of one's own ability.
- Covetousness** - is an excessive desire for worldly things.
- Lust** - is the desire for the sinful pleasures forbidden by the 6<sup>th</sup> commandment ( i.e.) inappropriate sexual desire.
- Anger** -excessive emotion of hatred against any person or a desire for revenge.
- Gluttony** - excessive desire for food or drink.
- Envy** - is the feeling of sorrow at others good fortune, or joy at evil that befalls another individual.
- Sloth** - is laziness of mind or body.

These sins are the sources of other sins or are the direct cause of other sin.

## The Stranger

A few months before I was born, my Dad met a stranger who was new to our small Tennessee town. From the beginning, Dad was fascinated with this enchanting newcomer and soon invited him to live with our family. The stranger was quickly accepted and was around to welcome me into the world a few months later.

As I grew up, I never questioned his place in my family. In my young mind, he had a special niche. My parents were complementary instructors: Mom taught me the word of God, and Dad taught me to obey it. But the stranger, he was our storyteller. He would keep us spellbound for hours on end with adventures, mysteries and comedies.

If I wanted to know anything about politics, history or science, he always knew the answers about the past, understood the present and even seemed able to predict the future! He took my family to the first major league ball game. He made me laugh, and he made me cry. The stranger never stopped talking, but Dad didn't seem to mind.

Sometimes, Mom would get up quietly while the rest of us were shushing each other to listen to what he had to say, and she would go to her room and read her books (I wonder now if she ever prayed for the stranger to leave.) Dad ruled our household with certain moral convictions, but the stranger never felt obligated to honor them. Profanity, for example, was not allowed in our home... not from us, our friends or any visitors. Our longtime visitor, however, got away with four-letter words that burned my ears and made my Dad squirm and my mother blush.

My Dad was a teetotaler who didn't permit alcohol in the home, not even for cooking. But the stranger encouraged us to try it on a regular basis. He made cigarettes look cool, cigars manly and pipes distinguished. He talked freely (much too freely!) about sex. His comments were sometimes blatant, sometimes suggestive, and generally embarrassing.

I now know that my early concepts about relationships were influenced strongly by the stranger. Time after time, he opposed the values of my parents, yet he was seldom rebuked... and NEVER asked to leave. More than fifty years have passed since the stranger moved in with our family. He has blended right in and is not nearly as fascinating as he was at first.
