

Maintenance Work

Every month we have a maintenance collection, and some ask what we do with the money. OLV is comprised of five (5) aging buildings, and as with all homeowners we have ongoing maintenance projects. Things break, they need to be fixed, repaired or replaced. In addition to the regular repairs, the following is a list of additional projects that were completed this summer or are in progress:

Convent

-Painted the front of the porch and the Carmen Road side.

-New furnace is being installed.

Carmen Road House

-Old carpet removed and replaced.

-Interior cleaned and painted.

Church

-Lower church was painted to minimize the cleaning of finger prints and other markings.

-Electrical outlets added; we are scheduled to have the chandeliers fixed, add additional Sanctuary lighting and a ceiling fan in the atrium.

- Harriot Ave entrance will be power washed.

-Atrium windows will be cleaned.

School

-Entire building was painted, including the gym.

-Second floor complete transformation, including a new CCD Office and Teachers Library.

-New desks purchased and assembled for CCD office.

-3 flat screen TVs and carts purchased and assembled.

-Second floor hallway, classrooms and steps were waxed.

-Ceiling tiles in 2 classrooms were removed and replaced; front hallway tiles were removed and replaced; the tile outside the Teachers' Library will be replaced.

-Vents in the 2nd floor bathrooms were fixed and are now operational.

-Roughly 60 second-hand desks were painted for CCD classrooms.

Olympic Gold for Catholic Homeschooler Featured

Simone Arianne Biles was born March 14, 1997. The other night she became the 2016 Olympic individual all-around champion. But this little dynamo is no stranger to winning. She is a three-time world all-around champion, three-time world floor champion, two-time world balance beam champion, four-time US national all-around champion, and a member of the gold medal-winning American teams at the 2014, the 2015 World Artistic Gymnastics Championships and the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro.

More importantly from our perspective, Simone Biles is a Roman Catholic home-schooler who might have been a victim of abortion had her birth mother been someone other than Shannon Biles who suffered from drug and alcohol addiction but, rather than aborting her baby, gave Simone up for adoption. The story is like something out of a feel-good movie, with little Simone—rather than ending up in a dumpster or sucked into a vacuum or having her head stabbed by an abortion doctor—getting a chance to live, and then going on to become the first woman in history to win three consecutive world all-around titles and, by the way, the most decorated American female gymnast in World Championships history, with a total of fourteen medals, ten of them gold.

Why? Because she was taken in by a loving and generous family who believed in her, challenged her, and showed her how to love Christ and keep her Catholic faith -- all of which was only possible because Simone's birth mother cared more for the sanctity of the life of her child than her own "reproductive rights as a woman." In 2003 Simone's grandparents took the child and her sister, Adria, out of foster care, in order to give them a loving home and a chance to thrive despite all they'd been through. Simone's grandfather is a retired air traffic controller while her grandmother is the former co-owner of a chain of nursing homes, and a woman obviously blessed with great compassion.

Simone Biles spent all her secondary education as a homeschooler and graduated in the summer of 2015. The family is Roman Catholic, and the little gymnast, who is now taking the world by storm, lights a votive candle to St. Sebastian (patron saint of athletes) before all of her meets. She also keeps her rosary with her at all times, and isn't afraid to proudly admit it. The 19-year-old told US Weekly that her mother gave her the cherished rosary, and that she keeps it with her at all times, praying before every competition "just in case."

I'm not much of an Olympics guy. I got tired of all the politically correct claptrap that goes along with the games. I've discouraged my own children from paying any attention to them, in fact. But I do find it singularly annoying when the "up close and personal" stories that dominate the Olympic headlines are about Muslim athletes or transgenders or whatever, and then a story like this is ignored completely—the most decorated woman gymnast in Rio is an adopted, home-educated, Roman Catholic who prays the rosary and relies on God and His blessed Mother to help make her the best person and athlete she can be.

Kind of a big deal, unless you're a one of the cold chroniclers of Christophobia in the mainstream media—in which case it's cover-up time. Whatever. The media will do what they do best. But the story of Simone Biles is a little shaft of light in a big world of darkness. It's so encouraging to see that, despite everything, little miracles like this are still happening every day and all over the world. A drug-addicted alcoholic living in Cleveland had enough goodness left in her soul to do the right thing, even when the whole world was telling her to do the wrong thing. She kept the child, put her up for adoption, and great things happened.

God is good and all is not lost. All glory and honor to Him, and may He bless and keep Shannon Biles for giving a dreary world something good to believe in for a change -- a brilliant little gymnast who's proudly in love with Jesus Christ.

National Baseball Hall of Fame

Mike Piazza, the newest inductee of the National Baseball Hall of Fame, gave a shout-out to Pope Benedict XVI and his mother Veronica. Piazza said in his induction speech Sunday, "She gave me the gift of my Catholic faith, which has had a profound impact on my career and has given me patience, compassion and hope," and "Pope Benedict XVI said, 'One who has hope, lives differently.'" "Mom, you raised five boys, and you were always there for me."

Religious Freedom Report

Bill Donohue comments on the findings of the 2015 International Religious Freedom Report issued by the U.S. State Department:

It is a mistake to ascribe all religious persecution to Muslim madmen who belong to terrorist groups such as ISIS, al Qaeda, al Shabab, and Boko Haram. The sad fact is that Muslim-run governments are centrally involved in oppression, as are Communist-run governments.

The Report cites Penn State researchers who found that "the number of countries that require some sort of [religious] registration has increased significantly over the last two decades, to nearly 90 percent of all countries." Worse is the practice of punishing people for merely criticizing Islam or converting to another religion. Such persons are routinely tortured and killed, with the approval of street mobs.

In Mauritania, a blogger critical of the government was initially sentenced to death, but it was revoked after he apologized; he is still in prison. Mobs in Pakistan have killed 62 persons for blasphemy since 1990. Sudan punishes anyone who claims that the Quran—not the government—is the sole source of authority.

In Saudi Arabia, a Palestinian poet was sentenced to 8 years in prison and 800 lashes (he was initially sentenced to death); three others had their death sentences upheld. The Syrian government has been on a tear killing Sunnis and other religious minorities. Iran executed at least 20 persons for blasphemy. Religious minorities were tortured in Eritrea, and three persons were legally stoned to death in Brunei for apostasy. China demolished several Catholic and Protestant churches, and "the exercise of religious freedom continued to be nearly non-existent in North Korea."

Still worse is the fact that the Obama administration continues to cut deals with Iran, and has been muted in its condemnation of Christian persecution. Beyond belief is the fact that the Clinton Foundation has received upwards of \$25 million from the thugs in Saudi Arabia. VIETNAMESE IMMIGRANT

The following is the text of a speech given by a Vietnamese immigrant who came to the US through our legal system. He shares his story of claiming the American Dream as his own and how grateful he is to be a part of our nation. I believe his story could represent the experience of all who come here legally. Those who completed the time consuming and sometimes frustrating system to earn citizenship certainly have a greater appreciation for what they have.

On Saturday, July 24, 2010 the town of Prescott Valley, AZ, hosted a Freedom Rally. Quang Nguyen was asked to speak on his experience of coming to America and what it means. He spoke the following in dedication to all Vietnam Veterans. Thought you might enjoy hearing what he had to say:

35 years ago, if you were to tell me that I am going to stand up here speaking to a couple thousand patriots, in English, I'd laugh at you. Man, every morning I wake up thanking God for putting me and my family in the greatest country on earth. I just want you all to know that the American dream does exist and I am living the American dream. I was asked to speak to you about my experience as a first generation Vietnamese-American, but I'd rather speak to you as an American.

If you hadn't noticed, I am not white and I feel pretty comfortable with my people. I am a proud U.S. citizen and here is my proof. It took me 8 years to get it, waiting in endless lines, but I got it, and I am very proud of it.

I still remember the images of the Tet offensive in 1968, I was six years old. Now you might want to question how a 6-year-old boy could remember anything. Trust me, those images can never be erased. I can't even imagine what it was like for young American soldiers, 10,000 miles away from home, fighting on my behalf.

35 years ago, I left South Vietnam for political asylum. The war had ended. At the age of 13, I left with the understanding that I may or may not ever get to see my siblings or parents again. I was one of the first lucky 100,000 Vietnamese allowed to come to the U.S. Somehow, my family and I were reunited 5 months later, amazingly, in California. It was a miracle from God.

If you haven't heard lately that this is the greatest country on earth, I am telling you that right now. It was the freedom and the opportunities presented to me that put me here with all of you tonight. I also remember the barriers that I had to overcome every step of the way. My high school counselor told me that I cannot make it to college due to my poor communication skills. I proved him wrong. I finished college. You see, all you have to do is to give this little boy an opportunity and encourage him to take and run with it. Well, I took the opportunity and here I am.

This person standing tonight in front of you could not exist under a socialist/communist environment. By the way, if you think socialism is the way to go, I am sure many people here will chip in to get you a one-way ticket out of here. And if you didn't know, the only difference between socialism and communism is an AK-47 aimed at your head. That was my experience.

In 1982, I stood with a thousand new immigrants, reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and listening to the National Anthem for the first time as an American. To this day, I can't remember anything sweeter and more patriotic than that moment in my life.

Fast forwarding, somehow I finished high school, finished college, and like any other goofball 21 year old kid, I was having a great time with my life. I had a nice job and a nice apartment in Southern California. In some way and somehow, I had forgotten how I got here and why I was here. He smiled and said yes. I shook and held his hand. The grown man began to well up. I walked away as fast as I could and at that very moment, I was emotionally rocked. This was a profound moment in my life. I knew something had to change in my life.

It was time for me to learn how to be a good citizen. It was time for me to give back.

You see, America is not just a place on the map, it isn't just a physical location. It is an ideal, a concept. And if you are an American, you must understand the concept, you must accept this concept, and most importantly, you have to fight and defend this concept. This is about Freedom and not free stuff. And that is why I am standing up here.

Brothers and sisters, to be a real American, the very least you must do is to learn English and understand it well. In my humble opinion, you cannot be a faithful patriotic citizen if you can't speak the language of the country you live in. I thank you for your sacrifices, and I thank you for giving me the freedom and liberty I have today. I now ask all veterans, firefighters, and police officers, to please stand. On behalf of all first generation immigrants, I thank you for your services and may God bless you all.
