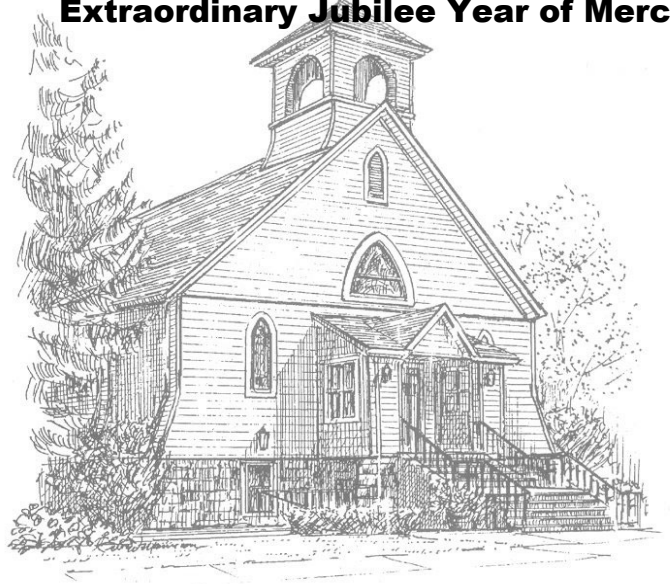

Assisted Suicide Bill

On October 6, 2016, the Assembly Appropriations committee released Assembly Bill 2451 which would make assisted suicide legal in NJ. The full Assembly voted on A2451, the Physician Assisted Suicide bill, on 10/20/16.

Asm. 10/20/2016 – 3RDG FINAL PASSAGE – Yes {41} No {29} Not Voting {5} Abstains {5}

An identical bill - S2474 - has been introduced in the Senate.

This assisted suicide bill is a direct threat to anyone viewed as a cost liability to an insurance company or the government under Obamacare. With the costs of Obamacare rising at a minimum of 25% is it so difficult to imagine them moving the minds and hearts of people toward ending their lives in advance to contain costs? Not really when we've seen what the government operatives push and what the media assists! In an era of cost control and managed care, patients with lingering illnesses may be branded as an economic liability, an undue burden on their family, and decisions to encourage death could be driven by cost. The facts are clear - in California, in Vermont and in Oregon - states that have passed assisted suicide bills - insurance companies have denied individuals healthcare coverage, but offered them low cost drugs to end their life. CHRISTIAN GRAFFITI

Graffiti made by early Christians in the catacombs of Rome, asked that Christians, who passed by, pray for their deceased relatives. But there is no point in praying for those in Heaven who are already in the presence of the Almighty, nor is there any point in praying for those consigned to all eternity in Hell, from which there is no return. These early Christians believed that the souls of the departed were in an intermediate place awaiting entrance into Heaven – Purgatory.

DID YOU KNOW

The Church teaches that abortion or euthanasia is a grave sin. The Encyclical Letter *Evangelium vitae*, with reference to judicial decisions or civil laws that authorize or promote abortion or euthanasia, states that there is a “grave and clear obligation to oppose them by conscientious objection. [...] In the case of an intrinsically unjust law, such as a law permitting abortion or euthanasia, it is therefore never licit to obey it, or to “take part in a propaganda campaign in favor of such a law or vote for it” (no. 73). **Christians have a “grave obligation of conscience not to cooperate formally in practices which, even if permitted by civil legislation, are contrary to God’s law.** Indeed, from the moral standpoint, it is never licit to cooperate formally in evil. [...] This cooperation can never be justified either by invoking respect for the freedom of others or by appealing to the fact that civil law permits it or requires it” (no. 74). **A Catholic would be guilty of formal cooperation in evil, and so unworthy to present himself for Holy Communion, if he were to deliberately vote for a candidate precisely because of the candidate’s permissive stand on abortion and/or euthanasia... wrote Pope Benedict XVI when he was Cardinal Ratzinger and in charge of the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith in a 2004 letter when asked if one could vote for a pro-choice/pro-abortion candidate.**

Cardinal Burke's Excellent Advice for the Presidential Election

LifeSiteNews has a great article that taps the mind and heart of Cardinal Burke on the upcoming U.S. Presidential election. I could not agree more with the Cardinal, which means we remain 100% on the "think alike" meter.

Here's some excerpts ... you can read the rest over at LifeSiteNews ... "I think that what we have to do in this time is to look at both candidates to see if one of them will not, at least in some way, advance the common good, both with respect to the good of human life, the good of the family, the freedom of conscience, the care of the poor, and to look at that very carefully," the Cardinal told reporters during an international teleconference conducted by Carmel Communications and attended by LifeSiteNews.

Cardinal Burke, the patron of the Sovereign Military Order of Malta and the former archbishop of St. Louis, said that even if Catholics see problems with both candidates on various issues, they nevertheless can vote for the one who supports Catholic values the most.

"More than likely the judgment will be that neither candidate ideally answers these questions all in the way that we want. But given the nature of our government, can we in conscience support one of the candidates, at least, who, while maybe [he or she] doesn't support everything that we believe and know is important, will at least support it to a certain extent with the hope that that candidate can be convinced to embrace evermore fully the common good," he said.

Burke warned Catholics against not voting at all and against the practice of writing in the name of a preferred candidate on the ballot, saying it could inadvertently cause the election of a candidate who does not respect life, family, and freedom.

"And I understand these sentiments very well. But one also has to be very prudent, and know that by not voting at all you are probably favoring one candidate or another," he said, adding that even if Catholics wrote in the name of a favored candidate, it would be unlikely for such a person to become elected.

"The moral weight to voting is indeed very heavy. In other words, every vote counts," he said. Burke urged Catholics to study carefully the positions of both running candidates before voting.

"Those are difficult considerations, and I don't say any of this in a kind of easy way. But I do think that Catholics especially need to be very cautious and not simply opting out, or good pro-life people and good pro-family people, simply just throwing up their hands. I would just urge them to study the position of both candidates, to the fullest possible degree, to see whether or not one of them will not advance, at least to some degree, restoration of the civilization of life and love in our country."

PRIESTS FOR LIFE

10/20/16 Washington, D.C. – (John Hines – OAN Sr Correspondent)
Because the Supreme Court hangs in the balance, a group called “Priests for Life” is saying it is a moral imperative for Catholics and other pro-life voters to vote in support of pro-life candidates in this election, says Father Frank Pavone of Priests for Life.

“Brothers and sisters, we are here on behalf of Priests for Life and our membership across the country Priests for Life, Deacons for Life, and all the lay faithful who join themselves with us, people also across denominational lines to make a very clear and strong statement here. Any candidate, any political party, that stands for legal abortion believes in a tyrant state. There are no two ways to look at this question,” said Pavone, Chairman, Priests for Life.

And a tyrant state – according to Fr. Pavone– does not respect life. Of the two parties and their platforms, Priests for Life offered a comparison, but not an endorsement. And yet Fr. Pavone said any actions a future president may take to steer the nation back to a culture of life could compensate for other moral weaknesses in a candidate.

“Whatever the past or present immorality is in these candidates, I cannot possibly imagine more of a reparation for evil than to steer this nation in such a direction by signing the right legislation and by appointing the right kind of judges to begin eradicating this nation of the kind of immorality that we’re all concerned about,” said Pavone.

And appointing the right kind of judges to the Supreme Court is why voting for life in this election is so important, says Deacon Keith Fournier a constitutional lawyer.

“The next President of the United States—and we will only have one of two people—in that Oval Office after January. And that person will choose—I believe– as many as four justices of the Supreme Court that will affect the state of Constitutional law for 30 years or more. Right now hanging in the balance is whether or not we will recognize the fundamental right to life of our youngest neighbors in the womb ... and Roe V. Wade has got to go,” said Deacon Fournier.

Roe V. Wade just might go if the Priests for Life have their way. And these priests believe there is only one presidential candidate or party platform that will help them do that by changing the direction of the Supreme Court.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Most parishes are now aware of the catechumenate and the journey of new faithful in the RCIA, but this form of sacramental initiation disappeared from view in the thirteenth century along with many other ancient practices. Life back then was hard, and often too short, and priests were increasingly insistent about the responsibility of parents to baptize children in danger of death. Since everyone in that society was under unimaginable threat from famine, warfare, and plague, the liturgical rites changed quickly. Everyone was in danger of death all the time. No longer were babies immersed in fonts, being lowered into the water, although the ritual books never backed down from immersion. Infusion was the new way, a simple pouring of a few drops of water on the child’s forehead. The catechumenate collapsed, being reduced to the recitation of the Creed and an Our Father at every baptism. Amazingly, any provision for adult baptism was shelved, so that as late as the 1950s, a person being baptized was presumed to be an infant, unable to answer for him or herself. Questions of creed and commitment were put to the godparents, not to the person being baptized. Even Dorothy Day and Thomas Merton, famous adult converts, remained mute at their baptisms while their sponsors answered for them. In hindsight all this appears strikingly odd, yet it was accepted as the way things were. We have good reason to give thanks for the vigorous reforms of the last fifty years!
