QUESTION?

Where do we get the ashes that are used on Ash Wednesday?

We begin Lent with ashes, the burnt remains of last year's palms. Surprisingly, the use of ashes was reserved for serious public sinners. Eventually, they grew in popularity; in 1091 Pope Urban II mandated the use of ashes for all Catholics. This is to show that we will turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We also remove all signs of joy and festivity to focus on the core of our Faith. That is why from Ash Wednesday to the Easter Vigil we omit the "Alleluia" (a Hebrew word which means "Praise God") since it is our most joyful word of praise, and we also omit the joyful "Gloria" from the Sunday Mass. Through prayer, works of mercy, acts of self-denial, and Lenten practices, we prepare for the Sacred Triduum and Easter.

HOMEBOUND

If you or anyone you know is homebound – even for a short duration of time - please contact the parish office so I or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion can be scheduled to bring the Eucharist to the sick and homebound.

2017 LENTEN REGULATIONS

The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the **First Sunday of Lent, March 5, 2017 to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, June 11, 2017.**

*Canon 920, §1. *All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year.*

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ashes will be distributed during the Masses. The Mass Schedule for the day is as follows: 6:30a.m., 8:00a.m., 12:00Noon, 5:00p.m., 6:00p.m. Latin, and 7:15p.m. There will also be a Service and general distribution of ashes at 3:20p.m.. As a reminder Ash Wednesday is a day of both Fast and Abstinence. On this particular day only one (1) full meal is permitted and no meat is permitted. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

Collection for Priests' Retirement Fund

On Ash Wednesday – March 1 – we will have a special collection at all Masses to support the Archdiocesan Priests' Retirement Fund. This collection is a way to ensure that this program, which provides a modest retirement benefit to priests who have served the Archdiocese faithfully for many decades, will continue to have adequate resources to meet the needs in the years ahead. The people of this parish are always generous, and we thank you for your support of this special collection.

Just a reminder we have Exposition and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Fridays from 12:00Noon – 3:00PM.

So stop by and adore Our Eucharistic Lord.

Europeans spend \$11 billion a year on ice cream which is \$2 billion more than is estimated to provide clean water and safe sewers for the world's population. Americans spend \$8 billion a year on cosmetics which is \$2 billion more than the estimated total needed to provide basic education for everyone in the world.
