SPIRITUAL EXCERPT "PENANCE"

We all know that we need to be sorry for our sins, and yet we seem to know it much less than we used to. Personal penance, which in some way was painful or unpleasant, used to be part of the Christian life. For Catholics, it meant fasting, extra prayers, generosity to the poor, and just putting up with life without complaining. Somehow, in the last few decades, we moved away from any unpleasantness in fulfilling our Christian duties. We felt we had to have cushy, padded kneelers in church. We now have practically no Eucharistic fast, and our current Lenten fast would have brought laughter to the early Christians or even to those of the early twentieth century. Penance is supposed to be tough. As the three sacred days of Holy Week approach, those of us in the hospital have little opportunity to do traditional penances. Because of illness, we also feel that we are doing enough. Perhaps a lot of other people who are not in the hospital but who have severe problems, heavy crosses, or chronic difficulties with family all feel that they too are doing enough. But this is a time to do more, or to do better what we always do, and to do it with much love for Christ. Because of the film *The Passion of the Christ*, millions of people have a better awareness of what Christ suffered for us. Penance is the scriptural way of showing one's gratitude.

REVERENT CLOTHING

In our much less formal culture, gone are the days of “Sunday best”, but have we gone too far with beachwear, gym attire, workout rags and the like at Mass? We are a Church of outward signs; what does your clothing say about your understanding of what happens at Mass? While the Lord loves everyone and accepts us as we are, and there are emergencies, are we *giving witness* to the *sacred nature of the Mass* if we just “come as we are”?

THE SIGN OF THE CROSS

An Acceptance of Suffering: Jesus promised us that suffering would be a normal part of a disciple's life (see Lk. 9:23-24). So, when we mark our bodies with the Sign, we are embracing whatever pain comes as a consequence of our faith in Christ. Making the Sign is our taking up the cross and following Him (Lk.9:25). At the same time, however, it comforts us with the realization that Jesus, who endured the Crucifixion for us, now joins us in our suffering and supports us. Signing ourselves also announces another significant truth: with St Paul, we are celebrating that our afflictions as members of the Body of Christ contribute to the Lord's saving work of perfecting the Church in holiness.

Kidz Korner Answers

March is dedicated to Saint Joseph.

--JESUS' DEATH

At the age of 33, Jesus was condemned to the death penalty. At the time crucifixion was the "worst" death. Only the worst criminals were condemned to be crucified. Yet it was even more dreadful for Jesus, for unlike other criminals condemned to death by crucifixion Jesus was nailed to the cross by His hands and feet, rather than tied. Each nail was 6 to 8 inches long. The nails were driven into His wrist, not into His palms as is commonly portrayed. There's a tendon in the wrist that extends to the shoulder. The Roman guards knew that when the nails were being hammered into the wrist, that tendon would tear and break, forcing Jesus to use His back muscles to support himself, so that He could breathe. Both of His feet were nailed together. Thus He was forced to support Himself on the single nail that impaled His feet to the cross. Jesus could not support himself with His legs for long because of the pain, so He was forced to alternate between arching His back and using his legs just to continue to breath. Imagine the struggle, the pain, the suffering, the courage. Jesus endured this reality for over 3 hours. Yes, over 3 hours! Can you imagine this kind of suffering? A few minutes before He died, Jesus stopped bleeding. He was simply pouring water from his wounds. From common images we see wounds to His hands and feet and even the spear wound to His side... but do we remember the many wounds made to his body. A hammer driving large nails through the wrists, the feet overlapped and a nail hammered through the arches, then a Roman guard piercing His side with a spear. And ... before the nails and the spear, Jesus was whipped and beaten. The whipping was so severe that it tore the flesh from His body. The beating so horrific that His face was torn and his beard ripped from His face. The crown of thorns (two to three inch thorns) cut deeply into His scalp. Most men would not have survived this torture. He had no more blood to bleed out, only water poured from His wounds. The human adult body contains about 5 liters (just over a gallon) of blood. Jesus poured all 5 liters of his blood; He had three nails hammered into His body; a crown of thorns on His head and, beyond that, a Roman soldier who stabbed a spear into His chest. All these without mentioning the humiliation He passed after carrying His own cross for almost 2 kilometers, while the crowd spat in his face and threw stones (the cross beam was almost 30 kg of weight, to which His hands were nailed). Jesus had to endure this experience, so that you may have free access to God. So that your sins can be "washed" away. All of them, with no exception! Don't ignore this.

JESUS CHRIST DIED...FOR YOU! Do not believe that He only died for others (those who go to church or for pastors, bishops, etc). He died for you! It is easy to tell jokes or share silly photos, but when it comes to God, sometimes we feel ashamed to forward a message about Him on to others. We are worried of what they may think. Accept the reality, the truth, that JESUS IS THE ONLY SALVATION FOR THE WORLD.

No one is listening until You make a mistake!

YOUR ALTAR

O Lord, we bring to Your altar these offerings of our service: be pleased to receive them, we pray, and transform them into the Sacrament of our redemption.

During Mass, parents (and others!) often admonish children to "behave themselves", because they are in God's house. But are we "grown-ups" fully attuned to what happens in this sacred place, at God's holy altar? Whatever we bring to a Catholic altar – we literally bring to Christ Himself! All the prayers we utter before, or vows we make before, or sacrificial gifts we offer before a Catholic altar – are offered to Christ! No wonder we bow before the altar, and the ordained ministers venerate it with a kiss at Mass! Are you aware of what is happening each time you stand before our altar, or when your gifts are brought to our altar, or when you or a loved one celebrates a Sacrament: Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist or Anointing of the Sick before our altar, or when the bodies of our loved ones are honored before our altar?

This prayer asks Christ to receive EVERYTHING we bring to God's altar – and transform it into Himself! For the altar is the place of the ultimate exchange; at the altar, we offer back to God whatever He has entrusted to us; our service, our offerings, our very lives – which He receives and transforms into Himself! WOW!

REVERENCE IN CHURCH

When we come to church we should be silent. It is striking how many people have lost the sense of the holy. When they come into church they speak no differently from the way they would at Grand Central Terminal and very often, people have to be told to be quiet and remember where they are. If we stood in the presence of Christ we would not be laughing and gossiping with each other. We'd be speechless. The question is why don't we do that when we come into the house of God?

When you come into church, your eyes should be focused on the central point, which is the throne of God, His altar. Whenever you enter the church, whether the Mass is being celebrated or whether we are praying privately, God is present, dwelling in the tabernacle. Tabernacle means a tent. We have given God the tabernacle so that He who condescends to dwell within us may have a place as fine as we can offer in thanksgiving for the incarnation "word was made flesh", and "dwelt amongst us". God allows us to handle Him, but we are judged if we manhandle Him. God grants Himself to us. We are judged if we take Him for granted. The tabernacle reminds us that God is present. When we come into the church and the Blessed Sacrament is before us, we genuflect, "At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow." God, in His mercy, allows His house to be our house, but that requires of us a special heavenly etiquette and the most civilized thing we can do is to come into the house of God and pray silently and reverently."
