SPIRITUAL EXCERPT

God in the Ordinary

On the contrary, you must realize now, more clearly than ever, that God is calling you to serve him *in and from* the ordinary, secular, and civil activities of human life. He waits for us every day, in the laboratory, in the operating theatre, in the army barracks, in the university chair, in the factory, in the workshop, in the fields, in the home, and in all the immense panorama of work. Understand this well: there is *something* holy, something divine hidden in the most ordinary situations, and it is up to each one of you to discover it.

I often said to the university students and workers who were with me in the thirties that they had to know how to *materialize* their spiritual lives. I wanted to warn them of the temptation, so common then and now, to lead a kind of double life: on the one hand, an inner life, a life related to God; and on the other, as something separate and distinct, their professional, social, and family lives, made up of small earthly realities.

No, my children! We cannot lead a double life. We cannot have a split personality if we want to be Christians. There is only one life, made of flesh and spirit. And it is that life which has to become, in both body and soul, holy and filled with God: we discover the invisible God in the most visible and material things.

There is no other way, my daughters and sons: either we learn to find our Lord in ordinary, everyday life, or we shall never find him. That is why I tell you that our age needs to give back to matter and to the apparently trivial events of life their noble, original meaning. It needs to place them at the service of the kingdom of God; it needs to spiritualize them, turning them into a means and an occasion for a continuous meeting with Jesus Christ.

JUST A REMINDER

The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

SUNDAY MASS

The first precept of the Catholic Church is, "You shall attend Mass on all Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation." This precept is in accord with the Third Commandment, to keep holy the Sabbath, and it is supported by the Church's canon law. The Catechism states that Sunday Mass "is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants or the sick) or dispensed by their own pastor. **Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin**" [art. 2181]. Many Catholics have been told that they can fulfill the Sunday obligation by means other than attendance at Mass. **THIS IS NOT TRUE.** As the Church has always taught and as the Catechism makes clear, **there is no substitute for Mass attendance on Sundays and other days of obligation.** The Mass is the Catholic's greatest prayer and highest form of worship of God. To fail in this obligation is to fall into **MORTAL SIN.**

The Evangelists and Their Symbols

Christian tradition has long associated the authors of the four gospels with the four "living creatures" that are described as standing around the throne of God in *Revelation 4:6-7*:

"... around the throne ... are four living creatures: the first living creature like a lion, the second living creature like an ox, the third living creature with a face like a human face, and the fourth living creature like a flying eagle."

This, in turn, echoes the vision of Ezekiel in both 1:1-14 and in chapter 10:1-22.

ST. IRENAEUS OF LYON (about AD 120-202), in *Adversus haereses* 3.11.8, applies this imagery to the evangelists, as follows:

John is the lion because his Gospel relates "Christ's original, effectual and glorious generation from the Father ..." and also because it is a Gospel "full of all confidence."

Luke is the ox, because his Gospel begins with Zacharias offering sacrifice; Irenaeus also links this with the "fatted calf, about to be immolated for the finding again of the younger son" (a parable found only in Luke).

Matthew is the human face, because his Gospel begins with "the generation of Christ as a man." It is "the Gospel of Christ's humanity".

Mark is the soaring eagle, because his Gospel begins with "a reference to the prophetic spirit" (i.e., by quoting the prophet Isaiah). Irenaeus talks of "the winged nature of his Gospel," and says that it is a "compendious and cursory narrative, for such is the prophetic character."

SAINT AUGUSTINE OF HIPPO (in North Africa), AD 354-430 was not totally convinced by such an interpretation because it took account of "only the beginnings of the books, and not the complete overall plan of the evangelists." As an alternative, he proposes that:

The lion is Matthew, in whose Gospel the kingdom a constant theme: he underlines "the kingly character of Christ." So, Augustine says, it is Matthew who tells us of the Magi who come seeking the king; Herod is afraid of this king.

The ox is Luke, not just because of the way this Gospel begins, but because throughout, "Luke's object was to deal with what is priestly."

The human face represents Mark, because "he handles the things which the man Christ did."

All three, Augustine argues (in *De consensu evangelistarum* 1.6.9), concern themselves with "things which Christ did in the flesh," which is why they are represented by creatures of the earth.

John, on the other hand, "soars like an eagle...and gazes upon the light of the unchangeable truth."

SAINT JEROME (about AD 347-430), who was given the task of producing a complete translation of the Bible in Latin, proved to be the decisive influence for all later Christian tradition. In his *Preface to the Commentary on Matthew* he says:

Matthew is the human face, because he launches his Gospel with the human family of Jesus.

Mark is the lion, because his Gospel begins with the voice that roars in the desert like a lion "Prepare the way of the Lord."

Luke is the ox, because it begins with Zacharias the priest.

John is the eagle, who "soars to the heights to present the Word of God."

HOW TO BE HAPPY

Keep your heart free from hate, your mind free from worry. Live simply, expect little, give much, sing often, and pray always. Fill your life with love, scatter sunshine, forget self, and think of others. Do, as you would want done to you. These are the tried links in contentment's golden chain.

Godparent [Sponsor] Requirements

Canon [Church] law states a godparent [sponsor] must:

Be a Baptized and confirmed Roman Catholic who attends weekly Mass and receives Eucharist.

Be at least 16 years of age [exceptions are possible].

Not be one of the parents.

Lead a moral life in keeping with Church teaching, and be a good Catholic role model.

If married, be married according to Church law.

Be a registered member of their own current parish from which they must obtain an eligibility certificate; we can only give eligibility certificates to those registered in our parish!

Since only one Roman Catholic godparent is required, a baptized member of another Christian church [but not a Roman Catholic] may serve as a Christian Witness. Since godparents renew their baptismal promises during the Rite of Baptism, a non-baptized person cannot serve in this role.
