OLV CCD REGISTRATION

QUESTION?

What is the origin of America's archaic system of measurement?

America's system of measurement is derived from the old British Imperial System of Measurement, but some parts of this system can be traced back thousands of years. The mile - the Roman set measurement was the distance a soldier could march in one thousand double steps, about 5,000 feet. England's Queen Elizabeth I proclaimed in 1575 that the length should increase to 5280 feet so that it could be divided evenly (eight times) by the furlong (660 feet) which was the length of a plowed furrow in an ordinary field. The foot was originally by decree to be the size of France's Emperor Charlemagne's foot. In the 14th Century in England, the foot was standardized to be the length of 35 barleycoms laid end to end. England's King Henry I established the size of a yard to be the length from his nose to his extended fingertips. The inch was the length of a man's thumb from tip to first joint. A fathom was the length from fingertip to fingertip of the outstretched arms of a Viking. An acre was the amount of land a team of oxen could plow in a day. Eventually all these measurements became standardized.

Children of the 1930s: "The Last Ones"

Born in the 1930s we exist as a very special age cohort. We are the "last ones." We are the last, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the war itself with fathers and uncles going off. We are the last to remember ration books for everything from sugar to shoes to stoves. We saved tin foil and poured fat into tin cans.

We saw cars up on blocks because tires weren't available. My mother delivered milk in a horse drawn cart. We are the last to hear Roosevelt's radio assurances and to see gold stars in the front windows of our grieving neighbors. We can also remember the parades on August 15, 1945; VJ Day. We saw the "boys" home from the war, build their Cape Cod style houses, pouring the cellar, tar papering it over and living there until they could afford the time and money to build it out. We are the last who spent childhood without television; instead imagining what we heard on the radio. As we all like to brag, with no TV, we spent our childhood "playing outside until the street lights came on." We did play outside and we did play on our own. There was no little league.

The lack of television in our early years meant, for most of us, that we had little real understanding of what the world was like. Our Saturday afternoons, if at the movies, gave us newsreels of the war and the holocaust sandwiched in between westerns and cartoons. Newspapers and magazines were written for adults. We are the last who had to find out for ourselves.

As we grew up, the country was exploding with growth. The G.I. Bill gave returning veterans the means to get an education and spurred colleges to grow. VA loans fanned a housing boom. Pent up demand coupled with new installment payment plans put factories to work. New highways would bring jobs and mobility. The veterans joined civic clubs and became active in politics. In the late 40s and early 50's the country seemed to lie in the embrace of brisk but quiet order as it gave birth to its new middle class.

Our parents understandably became absorbed with their own new lives. They were free from the confines of the depression and the war. They threw themselves into exploring opportunities they had never imagined. We weren't neglected but we weren't today's all-consuming family focus. They were glad we played by ourselves "until the street lights came on." They were busy discovering the post war world.

Most of us had no life plan, but with the unexpected virtue of ignorance and an economic rising tide we simply stepped into the world and went to find out. We entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where we were welcomed. Based on our naive belief that there was more where this came from, we shaped life as we went.

We enjoyed a luxury; we felt secure in our future. Of course, just as today, not all Americans shared in this experience. Depression poverty was deep rooted. Polio was still acrippler. The Korean War was a dark presage in the early 50s and by mid-decade school children were ducking under desks. China became Red China. Eisenhower sent the first "advisors" to Vietnam. Castro set up camp in Cuba and Khrushchev came to power.

We are the last to experience an interlude when there were no existential threats to our homeland. We came of age in the late 40s and early 50s. The war was over and the cold war, terrorism, climate change, technological upheaval and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life with insistent unease.

Only we can remember both a time of apocalyptic war and a time when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty. We experienced both. We grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better not worse. We are the "last ones".

IT'S IN THE BIBLE

The phrase "No rest for the wicked," is one that is meant to say, "I must be evil and that is why I am burdened with so much work," comes to us from Isaiah 48:22.

REVERENT CLOTHING

In our much less formal culture, gone are the days of "Sunday best", but have we gone too far with beachwear, gym attire, workout rags and the like at Mass? We are a Church of outward signs; what does your clothing say about your understanding of what happens at Mass? While the Lord loves everyone and accepts us as we are, and there are emergencies, are we giving witness to the sacred nature of the Mass if we just "come as we are"?

RESPECT LIFE

In 1857, the U.S. Supreme Court decided the Dred Scott Decision. By a 7-2 vote, it ruled that black people were not "legal persons," that they were the property of the slave owner. Abolitionists protested, to be met with this answer. "We understand you oppose slavery and find it morally offensive. That is your privilege. You do not have to own a slave if you do not want to. But, do not impose your morality on a slave owner. He has the constitutionality protected right to choose to own a slave." (Sounds vaguely familiar.) In the famous Lincoln Douglas debates, Mr. Douglas defended the right to choose. Abraham Lincoln's answer comes down to us ringingly clear. His reply was, "No one has the right to choose to do what is wrong."
